

New Executive Director



Rev. Morrie Lawing will begin serving as the Executive Director of ONA in January 2025.

Morrie is no stranger to ONA. He has been in the ARP for 35 years with 28 of them involved in church planting. In 1996, Morrie, his wife Lori, and his family moved to North Carolina to begin the work of planting Ballantyne ARP Church. After this mission church was organized, they moved in 2005 to Denver, NC, to start another ARP church with full financial backing from Coddle Creek ARP. Through their continued prayers and God's sovereign purposes, Christ Church ARP was born, and Morrie served there for the past 20 years. When he was asked by a member of the search committee to consider leading ONA, he had no reason to leave his pastorate. In the end, the ONA Board revealed ultimately God's call for Morrie to serve as ONA's director and he is humbled and excited to see what the LORD will do.

What is something you want members of every ARP Church to know about ONA?

- It is presbyteries, not ONA, who start churches and ordain men who are seeking to a plant church. ONA is a ministry of support, helping presbyteries in this endeavor.
- Church planting men are not wholly different from any other pastor. We all are ordained ministers of the Word and sacrament, first and foremost. Some are just ministers that God chooses to call to start churches.

Any prayer request as you begin your new role as ONA Executive Director?

I endeavor to make the ARP known nationally, to speak of what the LORD is doing in our denomination. He has graciously brought us out of the ashes of liberalism decades ago, and we are poised to see His mighty hand at work again; not being content with the status quo, but growing in our commitment to confessional, reformed, vibrant churches.

- that our LORD would raise up many godly men who are interested in expanding the Kingdom by starting an ARP church.
- that our LORD would incline the hearts of sessions and churches to become excited about starting and even daughtering an ARP church.

Alan has led without drawing attention to himself. His steady disposition, kind manner, eye for detail, and seasoned wisdom has been an asset to church planters, to presbytery church extension committees, and to the ONA board and staff.

Tessa Taylor, Publications and Communications Administrator for ONA, summed up what many appreciate about Alan's leadership style. She said that he does not get "lost in the weeds," but keeps his eye on the goal and points those he leads in the right direction. He speaks to others diplomatically and does not polarize those with different points of view.

Alan's ministry in the ARP goes back to 1984 when he served as an associate pastor at the Church of the Atonement in Silver Spring, Maryland. In 1988, Church of the Atonement sent Alan to Olney, Maryland, as the mission developer and then pastor of Faith ARP Church, where he ministered until 2004.

In the coming months, Alan plans to take a sabbatical to think, pray, and seek God's call for the next season on his life. Alan and his wife, Eileen, also will invest in the lives of their grandchildren and travel. We thank Alan and Eileen for their fruitful 40-year ministry in the ARP.
